Grants

- **Dictionary definition:**

A sum of money given by a government or other organization for a particular purpose

- **Decision Book definition:**

Funds obtained from private or public foundations, governmental organisations, non-governmental organisations or institutions for a purpose specified by the donor.



Grants Strategy

According to the Decision Book of ELSA (Chapter 11, Article 4):

“ELSA shall rely on grants for at least 50% of its income, be eligible to the One-off structural grant of the European Youth Foundation and aim to have staff funded by grants.”

And...

4.2. The International Board of ELSA shall:

- a. **Establish a team dedicated to grants, staying for more than one year, and follow the reporting of the grants;**
- b. **Invest in the training of the team members on grants;**
- c. Visit the ERASMUS+ and the EYF offices in Strasbourg during the transition period;
- d. **Apply every year for Erasmus+ KA3 Civil Society Cooperation – Youth Grant;**
- e. **Apply every year for the International Activities grant of the European Youth Foundation;**
- f. Recruit full-time volunteers funded by the European Solidarity Corps or the European Voluntary Service;
- g. Recruit interns funded by the Erasmus Intern programme;
- h. Establish full-time employees funded by the MIRABEL grant;
- i. **Focus on finding new sources of grants, especially regional and national ones**

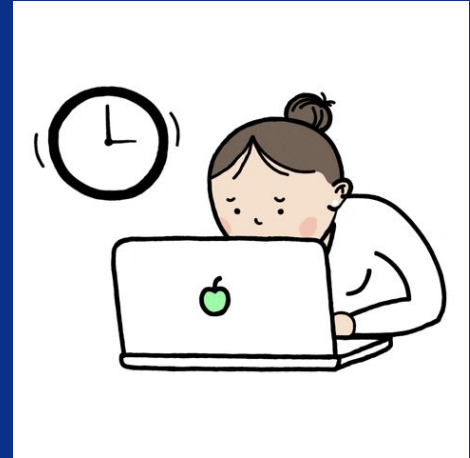
Advantages for Applying

- Monetary support
- Given for **specific purpose**
- Does **not need to be paid back**
- Most often does **not require to give anything in return**
- Most often given by **public institutions or foundations** seeking to promote value or vision
- Can be divided to **project and operational** grants



Timeline of a Grant

1. Researching
2. Applying
3. Obtaining & Using
4. Reporting



1. Researching

Most common grant sources are:

- National or regional governments
- Universities
- European institutions
- Foundations and funds

- **Newsletters**
- **Ministry and university webpages**
- **Sharing with other student associations**
- As always, **Google is our friend**

Could this be it?

- Does the purpose or vision of the granter fit your project?
- Is there an open application period?
- Is it possible to apply as NGO?
- Does it matter that we are non-political?
- Are we able to fit the conditions?
- Is this national or international grant?

2. Applying

- Reading through **instructions** carefully and using the formats preferred by the granter
- **Reserving enough time for writing** the application
- **Cooperate with the board** so both budget and event information is filled correctly.

2. Applying

- Reader does not know ELSA, start by explaining **who we are** and what we do, avoid abbreviations
- **Be concrete** and on the point
- **Elaborate the desired effect** of the project and how it fits the goals of the granter
- **Show the need** for the grant
- **“Sell” the idea** that we are doing something different or at least we can do it better



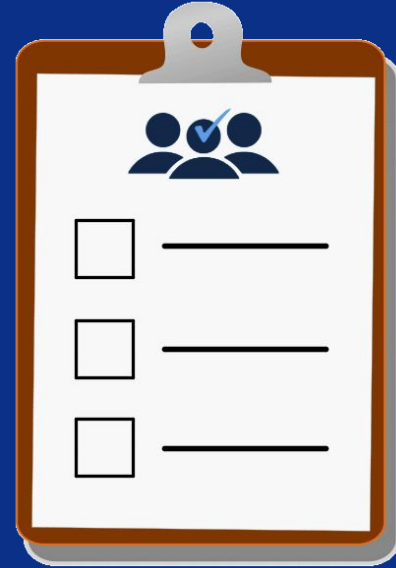
3. Obtaining & Using

- Usually the decision specifies the purpose
- While spending the money, make sure to collect all the **receipts**
- Depending on granted, it might be wise to keep **alcohol on separate receipts**

4. Reporting

- Most often **includes** profit / loss account, receipts, activity report and possibly evaluation forms
- Some granters have **condition** that event should **not make profit**
- While reporting in other language or currency than which receipts on, do necessary **conversions**
- Failure to report might mean **paying back** the grant (worst case with interest)
